1839 Apr	convicted of picking pockets in Bristol, sentenced to 10 years
1839 Dec	arrived in Sydney on the <i>Barossa</i> .
1843 Sep	transferred from Longbottom to Cockatoo Island, presumably as punishment
1846 Apr	Ticket of Leave for the Paterson district.
1847 Mar	employed by John Eales at Liverpool Plains
1849 Apr	absconded from his employment at Eales' station Walhallow

Other (source, details)

Darlinghurst Gaol Entrance Book, 4/6440 (reel 854), #1247 admitted 15 September 1843 from Longbottom with five others, all forwarded to Cockatoo Island 23 September 1843.

MM 11 April 1849. Walhallow, Liverpool Plains, William Jenkins, T/L holder, absconded from hired service of Charles H Humphrey [Eales' superintendent]. Note, by now he was free by servitude but probably offended under the Masters and Servants Act if he had a current work agreement with Eales/Humphries.
