1829 Jun	given up by her master, ordered by the court to the 1st class Factory
1829 Dec	sentenced to 3 months in 3rd class at the Factory for drunkenness and assault
1830 Aug	sentenced to 3 months in 3rd class at the Factory as incorrigible runaway
1831 Mar	involved in riot in female factory, Parramatta, sent to Newcastle for three years
1831 Aug	assigned to John Eales
1832 Jul	married William Johnson in Newcastle
1834 Aug	certificate of freedom

Other (source, details)

Sydney Gaol Entrance Book, SRNSW 4/6430 p303 [reel 851], 9 August 1828 committed by General Sessions Sydney for stealing flour from her master. Punishment: 1st class at the Factory, discharged from gaol 18 August to Parramatta.

Sydney Gaol Entrance Book, SRNSW 4/6430 p303 [reel 851], 10 November 1828 (as Quigley, Ann per Elizabeth [only one Quigley, namely Hannah, on the Elizabeth in 1828]) committed by General Sessions Sydney for being insolent to her mistress. Punishment: 3rd class at the Factory for six months, discharged from gaol 13 November 1828 to Parramatta.

Sydney Gaol Entrance Book, SRNSW 4/6431 p281 [reel 851], 28 June 1829 from General Sessions Sydney, given up by her master, sent to 1st class at Factory, discharged to Parramatta 30 October 1829 [note the gaol time!].

Sydney Gaol Entrance Book, SRNSW 4/6431 p281 [reel 851], 21 December 1829 from General Sessions Sydney for drunkenness and assault. Punishment: 3rd class at the Factory for 3 months, discharged to Parramatta 22 December 1829.

Sydney Gaol Entrance Book, SRNSW 4/6431 p281 [reel 851], 3 August 1830 from General Sessions Sydney, incorrigible runaway. Punishment: 3rd class at the Factory for 3 months, discharged to Parramatta 14 August 1830.

Sydney Gaol Entrance Book, SRNSW 4/6432 p181 [reel 851], 4 March 1831 from Parramatta, M Anderson JP, "mutinous conduct and riot in the F. Factory at Parramatta on the 9 February 1831". Penal settlement 3 years each (there were 38 women involved in the riot). They were sent to Newcastle in the Caledonia on the 4th March. [Similar entry in 4/6433, notes Londonderry as Native Place, Catholic, servant].

Newcastle Gaol Entrance Book admitted 5 March 1831 for 3 years in a penal settlement for mutinous conduct and riot in the female factory, Parramatta. **Sent to private service of John Eales near Maitland 22 August.**

Sydney Gaol Entrance Book, SRNSW X843 #1075 [reel 1864], free, admitted 8 May 1839 from Police for drunkenness, solitary confinement 96 hours.

Sydney Gaol Entrance Book, SRNSW 4/6439 #1913 [reel 853], free, admitted 2 August 1839 from Police for solitary confinement 44 hours. Discharged 3 (?) August 1839. [Similar record for same incident at X843 reel 1864, indicates offence was drunkenness and period of confinement was 144 hours.]

Sydney Gaol Entrance Book, SRNSW X843 #2763 [reel 1864], free, admitted 2 September 1839 from Police for drunkenness, solitary confinement 120 hours.

Sydney Gaol Entrance Book, SRNSW 4/6439 #2673 [reel 853], free, admitted 2 October 1839 from Police for solitary confinement 72 hours. Discharged 7 October

1839.

Sydney Gaol Entrance Book, SRNSW 4/6439 #3334 [reel 853], free, native of Londonderry, admitted 16 December 1839. Confine 1 month. Discharged 13 January 1840. [Similar record for same incident at X843 reel 1864, indicates offence was "common prostitute"].

Sydney Gaol Entrance Book, SRNSW 4/6439 #589 [reel 853], free, native of Londonderry, admitted 24 March 1840 from Police. Confine 2 months. Discharged 18 May 1840. [Similar record for same incident at X843 reel 1864, indicates "idle and disorderly person"]

Sydney Gaol Entrance Book, SRNSW 4/6439 #1910 [reel 853], free, native of Londonderry, admitted 23 September 1840 from Police. Confine 6 months. Discharged 4 November 1840.

Darlinghurst Gaol Entrance Book, SRNSW 4/6440 #467 [reel 854], Anne Quigley now Johnson, Elizabeth 1827 (sic), admitted 11 March 1842 from Gaol for trial. Acquitted Q Sessions 8 April 1842.
